Sewing and Knitting Class 2021

Four volunteers from Wearside u3a agreed to run a sewing class as part of the Summer Programme at Sunderland Bangladesh International Centre at the request of the centre manager. This was the first time they had run such a programme and so everyone was on a learning curve. The session was scheduled to run from 11am to 1 pm on Wednesdays for 4 weeks, however, as lunch was scheduled for 12.30, we had to be flexible and encourage the participants to finish earlier than expected. Starting became flexible too with children joining us when they arrived until the class was full. Whilst we initially planned to have any member of the families participating, the adults only came in to see what

the children were doing and for a brief chat – not easy as their English was sometimes not enough to express themselves.

We were set up in the training room with the other activities happening in the main hall. For good air flow the windows and door were open, so we could hear the times when excitement



caused a thunderous response to what was xgoing on in the hall – table tennis every day; boxing, games, music, icing cupcakes and also a lot of crafting activities. The children chose what they wanted to do but we asked that only the older children came into our class or we would have to reduce the numbers to one child per adult.

The recruitment of volunteers to work on the project was not across the whole of the u3a but rather limited to those who had been working together at the Wild Patch Community Garden throughout the pandemic. Even so planning beforehand was tricky due to other commitments and holidays away as well as the uncertainty about the composition of the families signing up to participate. By word of mouth, we had fabric, trimmings, sewing sundries, yarn and knitting needles donated and/or loaned. Needles, felt, needle threaders and short knitting needles were purchased with variable delivery times at a total cost of £24.

Of 15 children who signed into the class seven attended once, two attended twice and four attended all four sessions. This was not necessarily due to them not wanting to attend as we were constantly turning children away who wanted



to join in once the class was full. On one occasion a volunteer stayed late to work xan extra hour with two sisters who had been asking to attend since the previous day but had not arrived in time to do so. All children attending more than one class chose whether they were knitting or sewing that session. At the end of each class all uncompleted work was put in a named bag should they want to work more on it when they next attended. They could take completed projects home. It would have been nice to be able to send their knitting home with them to practice but we had been told not to allow them to take knitting needles away with them due to health and safety concerns. Those who attended four sessions did both

sewing and knitting. No knitting projects were completed. Sewing projects included: - felt needle cases, fabric stuffed hearts, felt brooches, and chicken pin cushions. It wasn't only girls who took up the opportunity. We did have one boy join the last session who did really well with his sewing project and completed his pincushion. His stitching was good as well.

Challenges included the uncertainty of what our aims were and that none of the participants had any experience of knitting. Some said they'd done some sewing but in reality, we had to start with threading the needle and tying a knot in the

end and provide crib sheets of the basic stitches (mind you, the fact that on a University Challenge program none of the students was able to identify basic embroidery stitches was a shock to us). The lack of dexterity when holding the knitting needles could possibly be attributed to the lack of penmanship nowadays required at school but was the centre of much discussion between us and with our friends.

Benefits were the look on a child's face when they achieved their first independent knitting stitch, or finished a whole row. The parents expressed delight when popping in to see what was happening. The children were as thrilled as we were when they completed a sewing project. The real accolade was in our final session when two of the children when approached by a sibling to join in the boxing class refused preferring to continue with what they were doing.

Unfortunately, we were not able to agree to continue the class on Saturday mornings as requested by parents due to other commitments.

Our pop-up Craft Interest Group met three times in October and November, and spent countless hours in between, knitting, crocheting, sewing, cutting, winding, twirling, gluing and foraging to make over 150 items to decorate our tree in the given theme 'It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas.' We'd decided to do a sort of deconstructed Advent Calendar; imagining all the items which could be

found behind the doors of the calendar 'escaping 'to an adjacent Christmas tree! So, four to six of each of at least 24 items were created. Colourful, kitsch and completely Christmassy it totally fulfilled the brief!



We had great fun decorating our tree and were delighted with our 2nd Prize which was awarded by Pam Royle, the ITV News presenter. We're already looking forward to the next event in a couple of years!

And, to gild the lily, over £2,600 was raised in appreciative donations. This will be shared by the church and the local Girl Guide troop.

Participants could choose to visit the Planetarium (open for the first time, post Covid-19), study gemstones and make their own creations using 'fake' gemstones, handle and learn about tools discovered in local archaeological digs, sketch North East birds and animals to a background of recorded birdsong, discuss the 'decolonisation 'of Egyptian artefacts and complete a quiz to learn about the Natural History Society of Northumbria.

Stockton Flyer

I'm sure members are aware of Stockton's historic connection with the railways of this country, but how many of you have heard of the Stockton Flyer?



'What is it?', I hear you ask.

Well, it's an installation in our High Street which commemorates just that — our railways — with a moving, noisy, smokey, whistle blowing train which comes up out of a grey stone plinth every day at 1 pm. The whole model is a stylized version of George and Robert Stephenson's engine Locomotion 1.

The Flyer was designed and built by Rob Higgs, a sculptor based in Cornwall, whose design won the most votes from the people of the town in a competition run by the council. It was unveiled in June 2016 as part of the Queen's official 90th birthday celebrations.

If you are ever in Stockton High Street around one o'clock in the afternoon, you will see a huddle of people standing about waiting for it to appear, taking

photographs and videos of its show and eagerly talking to children and grandchildren all about it. It's another item in the regeneration of our High Street, much in the news, which is getting underway as we speak. In 2022 we will see the start of the riverside park project which will change completely the south side of the High Street, but that's another story!

Raising the profile of u3a

To retain, increase and diversify the membership of our u3as, generally, the profile of our wonderful organisation needs to be raised – especially in 2022, the 40th Anniversary of the launch of the u3a movement.

A number of years ago, when I agreed to start a u3a Wooler newsletter, I felt that there was little need for an internal members' newsletter. In a small u3a, like Wooler (with less than 130 members) members are involved in several groups. Monthly meetings, pre-Covid, were well attended and the chat was lively! In a small market town like Wooler, members see each other frequently in the High Street, in the Co-op, in the Post Office queue, at community and church activities and events. In short, members are well-informed about u3a news, events and activities.



So, I decided to launch a quarterly e-bulletin exclusively for the many external organisations and contacts in the area. Copies are emailed to specific individuals for them to distribute to their own networks (eg Parish Council Clerks to their Councillors, Patient Participation Groups to their members, relevant charities and community groups to their Trustees, Church leaders to the key members of their congregations, the two GP Practice Managers in the Health Centre to their staff, Ageing Well Network and Glendale Connect members).

In addition, copies are emailed directly to the local County Councillor, Director of Public Health, Police and Crime Commissioner, MP, North of Tyne Mayor, Lords Joicey and Beith etc.

The u3a Wooler venue for Monthly Meetings and most groups is the old village workhouse, converted into the splendid Cheviot Centre. Copies of the e-bulletin are sent to the building managers (Glendale Gateway Trust Trustees and CEO), to the other occupants (including the Northumbria Police office, a building society branch, the tourist information centre, the branch library and a number of small businesses in the adjoining 'pods').

Currently, and for the last six years, the u3a Wooler external e-bulletin has a growing readership of 2,500 – incredible for a relatively small rural community.

u3a UK 40th Anniversary Events

Round Table Discussion: May

About the original u3a Vision and whether/how this has changed will be recorded and made available, 40 years after the first u3a was established at the Easter School in 1982. Participants will include Eric Midwinter (the remaining Founding Father).

Anniversary Quilt 'reveal': June

Any individual member, interest group or u3a has been eligible to enter an Anniversary Quilt competition (deadline was November 2021) to create blocks for a 40th anniversary quilt on the topic of Positive Ageing. The completed quilt will be revealed on Wednesday 1 June.

u3a Picnic in the Park: June

Over the Queen's Platinum Jubilee weekend (Thursday 2 – Sunday 5 June), u3as will be encouraged to hold picnics (in a park, on a beach, in a woodland, in a street, on a hill, beside a lake etc) to celebrate not just the Queen's Jubilee but also the u3a's 40th birthday.

'Open for Business': July

A Webinar will be held on the u3a High Street project, which will promote the results of surveys - carried out by over five hundred u3a members - of High Streets across the UK and describe the changes which have occurred over a 12-month period.

'Futures, Foresight and Horizon Scanning': July

The u3a Science Network will host an anniversary meeting in July to highlight u3a scientific activities and take the opportunity to engage the scientific community.

'Positive Futures in Older Age': August

This project started between u3a Edinburgh and the University of Stirling to demonstrate the impact older people can have on the community. Short stories will be collected from members from which plays will be written and performed at the Edinburgh Fringe and a London theatre.

u3a UK AGM: October

A hybrid streamed event on Thursday 6, to show how the profile of u3a locally, regionally, nationally and UK-wide can be raised further in the next 40 years.

u3a Wood 'reveal': November

The u3a Wood was launched in September 2021 with the intention that u3as would plant 5,000 trees as a contribution to the environment and the community. The wood will be 'revealed 'in Tree Week, 17 - 25 November, showing how many trees have been planted by u3a members.
